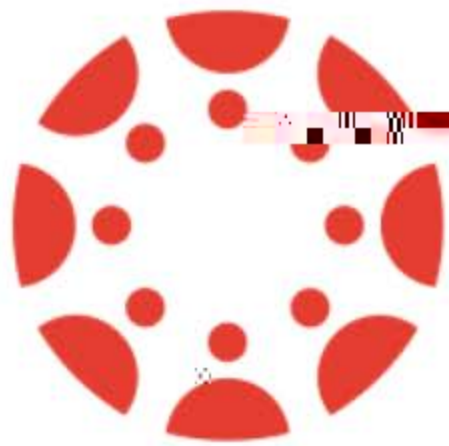

Weekly Content Moved

- Weekly module content moved from homepages to 'units' page
- Link at top of module homepages to new list of weekly content

Weekly Pages Improved

- More headers and dividers for easier accessibility
- More details about weekly tasks and expectations
- Clearer revision suggestions and further reading

Assessment Information

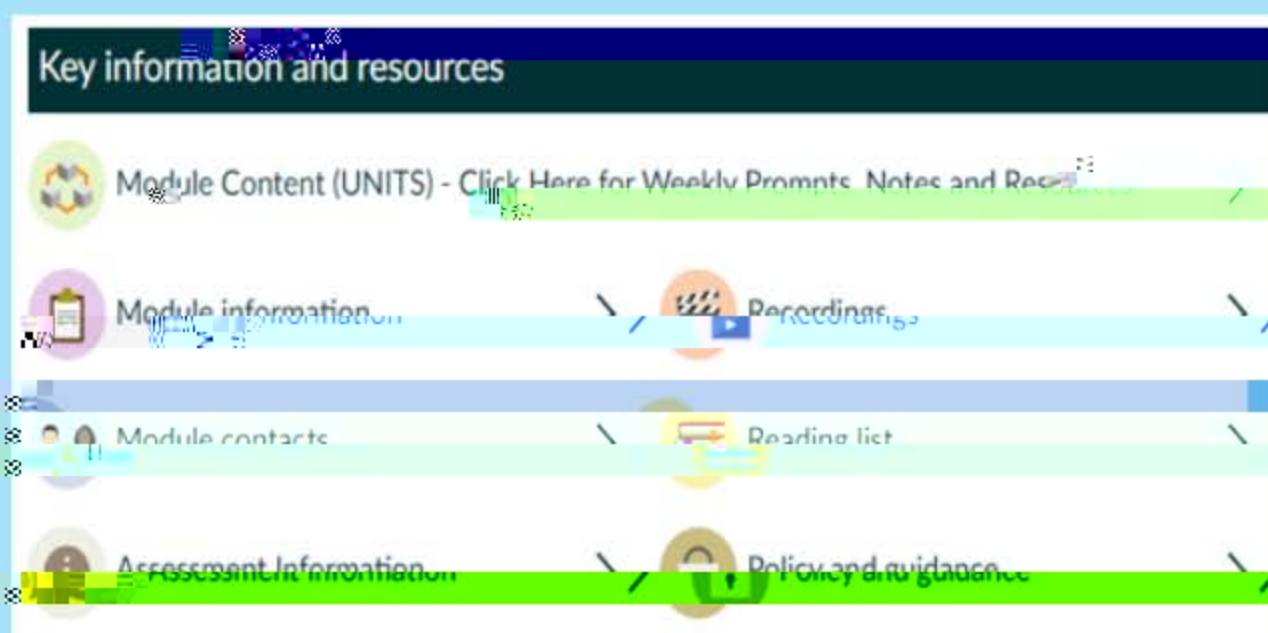
- 'Assignments and Guidance' placed in 'Assessment Information' page
- New page has assessment expectations, criteria, and academic skills

Mobile Optimisation

- New template works better on mobile devices
- Unnecessary images and long lists removed
- Tested on several mobile devices

LOCATION WEEKLY CONTENT

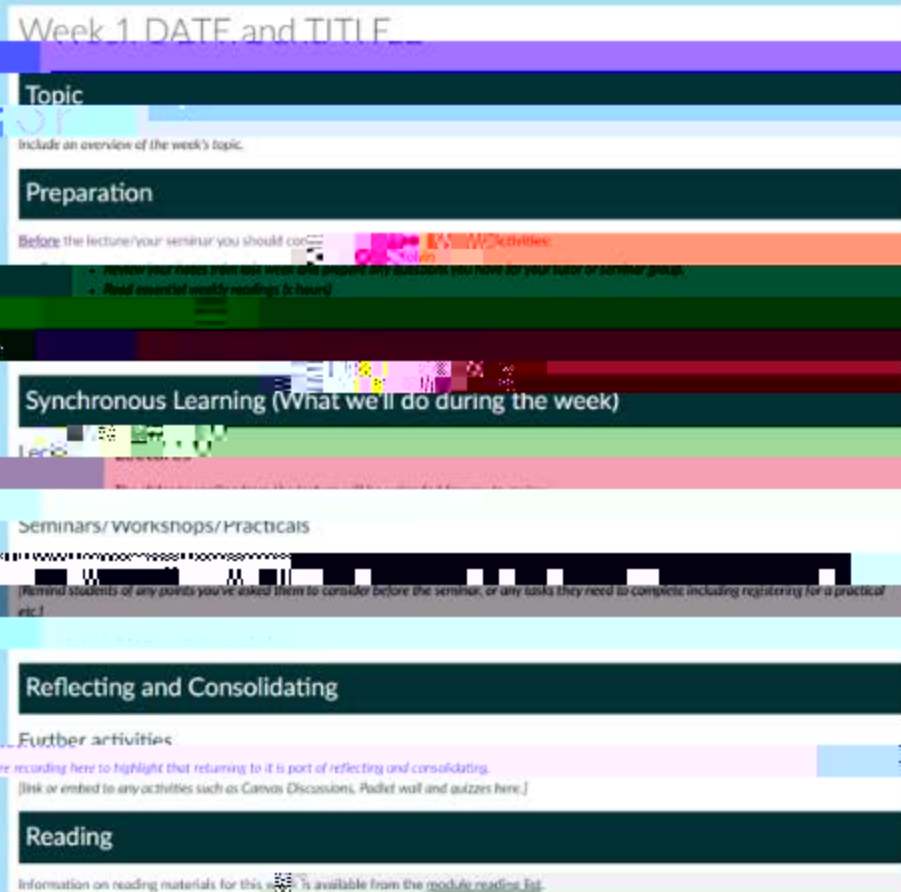


- List of weekly topics on module homepage replaced with 'Module Content' link (see left)
- Brings you to units page, which has a link to each weekly topic
- Easier for tutors to edit
- More accessible on mobile devices

CONTENT OF WEEKLY PAGES

Weekly pages have more sections, making it easier to read and use to effective work:

- **Topic** (outline of weekly topic)
- **Preparation** (contact hours)
- **Synchronous Hours** (work for lectures, seminars, etc)
- **Reflecting and Consolidating** (further learning activities and revision)
- **Reading** (link to the reading list)

 - Allow plenty of time for e-submissions (particularly for large files and media files)
- Check you are uploading the correct file/s and to the correct submission point
- Avoid using a Safari web browser on a MAC (we recommend Chrome or Firefox)

Academic Integrity and Avoiding Academic Misconduct:

Academic misconduct is cheating. It includes plagiarism, collusion, fabrication of results, and cheating in exams. It also includes but is not limited to: asking someone to write assignments for you, buying an essay from an essay writing company, or the presentation of AI-generated responses or text as your own work. This sort of cheating is known as 'personation' and is treated very seriously by the University.

Sometimes students commit academic misconduct without fully understanding what they have done something wrong. To protect yourself from committing academic misconduct, you should understand what it is and learn some of the common mistakes students make.
